Background

 Recognition that a broader range of tools are needed to meet environmental challenges

 Some companies consistently meet regulatory requirements and should be encouraged to go further

 Recognise and reward businesses with strong environmental track records

Background (cont'd)

In recognition of these factors, Ontario's Cooperative Agreements were developed

 innovative approach that utilizes a suite of incentives to encourage and reward companies that go beyond compliance in their environmental performance

• Developed in significant consultation with:

- Industry Associations
- ENGOs (Pollution Probe, Friends of the Earth, Environmental Defence Canada)
- Academics

Objectives

Environmental

 to achieve continuous improvement in environmental performance by regulated entities

Economic

 to provide a competitive edge to environmental leaders through incentives

Efficiency

to support efficiency gains in the ministry

Innovation

to promote innovation across Ministry programs

Guiding Principles

- Transparency through public involvement and public reporting
- Clear accountability, with specific performancebased targets
- Clear monitoring and reporting requirements
- Third party verification of performance
- Continuous improvement

Entry Requirements

- EMS
- Emissions Report (ESDM)
- Compliance

Facility Commitments

- Monitoring & Reporting
- Verification
- Communications/Outreach

Reduction Plan (PPRP)

 Targeted reductions of MOE priorities

INCENTIVES

Incentives

Exclusive enhanced comprehensive CofA

- Only available to Cooperative Agreement participants
- Addresses air, water and waste
- Provides operational flexibility including process changes and production increases
- Includes tailored administrative provisions

Incentives (cont'd.)

 Guaranteed 45 day turn-around time on CofA amendments

 Increased access to specialized technical assistance and guidance

- Single window access to Ministry
 - Dedicated customer service representative responsible to coordinate all aspects of the Cooperative Agreement

Incentives (cont'd.)

New technology approvals

 Faster decisions on applications for new technologies shown to be successful in other jurisdictions

Greater regulatory certainty

 Early consultation on the development of new regulations and legislation

Incentives

Public acknowledgement

 Ministry will promote participants in appropriate communications e.g. speeches, news releases

Internet recognition

Ministry will promote participants on MOE web site

Incentives

Industry-Government Roundtables

 Annual forums with the Minister of the Environment and senior Ministry officials

Phase Two Development

Participation in the development of additional incentives

Benefits of Participation

 Increased and quality communication resulting in better understanding of mutual objectives and how to meet them

• Increased efficiencies resulting from:

- faster approval times
- reduction in number of approvals required
- coordinated, efficient, tailored customer service
- streamlining / facilitation of issues
- increased access to technical resources and guidance
- Greater regulatory certainty = better business planning

Benefits of Participation (cont'd.)

- Value in being recognized as a leader
- Requirements build on existing systems:
 - -EMS
 - -ESDM
 - Communication / outreach systems
 - Continuous improvement objectives
- Opportunity to shape future directions

Entry Criteria

- Environmental management system (EMS)
 - generic EMS is acceptable; registration not required

 Current Emissions Summary and Dispersion Modeling Report (ESDM)

Signed record of sustained compliance

Facility Commitments

Communications and Outreach

- Open consultation mechanism to support two-way communication for public, community, interested parties (e.g. meeting, open house, workshop)
- Public response system

Provincial Priority Reduction Plan (PPRP)

- Commit to reduce 3 to 5 targeted substances and develop implementation plan
- Commitments of priority to the ministry
- Up to five year period to implement PPRP

Monitoring, Reporting and Verification

 Annual public reporting on progress toward meeting commitments

- 3rd party verification of performance in years 2 and 5
 - mechanisms must be in place
 - Includes site visit
 - Emissions for target substances and overall progress
 - External party, independent from data collection process and from the generation of annual report
 - May add verification audit to EMS audit

Monitoring, Reporting and Verification

 Continue to work with CEAA and other stakeholders to operationalize the verification component

 Refine verification protocol through feedback from CEAA members and stakeholders
